Twenty/Twenty Anniversary Celebration raised \$20,570 from past recipients and friends of the Foundation to endow two Teacher of Excellence Awards: Founding Executive Director Cardee Kilpatrick and former president, Sydney Jackson co-chaired the committee with members Margie Shedd, Julie Knowlton, Joan Humphries, C. J. Amason and Lane Norton. Former recipients were recognized at the banquet and storyboards displayed in the lobby summarized the Foundation's history with special tributes to visionary founder, Dr. C. B. Lord and founding Executive Director, Cardee Kilpatrick.

Investment Advisory Committee appointed subsequent to Section 7a of Foundation By-Laws: John Whitehead, Jim Newland, and Joe Frierson were appointed to advise the Foundation on its investment portfolio.

By-Laws Amended to require only one Board of Education Representative on Foundation Board. The reassignment of Allison Lucas-Wright to the BOE Finance Committee prompted the decision to amend the By-Laws to require only one Board of Education Representative, with the understanding that while BOE representation is critical to the Foundation, no district committee has more than one BOE member currently assigned.
